To help you, go to <http://www.metoffice.gov.uk/> and type in the postcodes from the table. This will give you information from weather stations.

You may need to zoom out a couple of times to find a weather station. Click on the nearest number to get more information – and also use the “measurement layers” on the right hand side. Good luck!

Where in the UK would you expect to be warmest? Coolest? Try to think why.



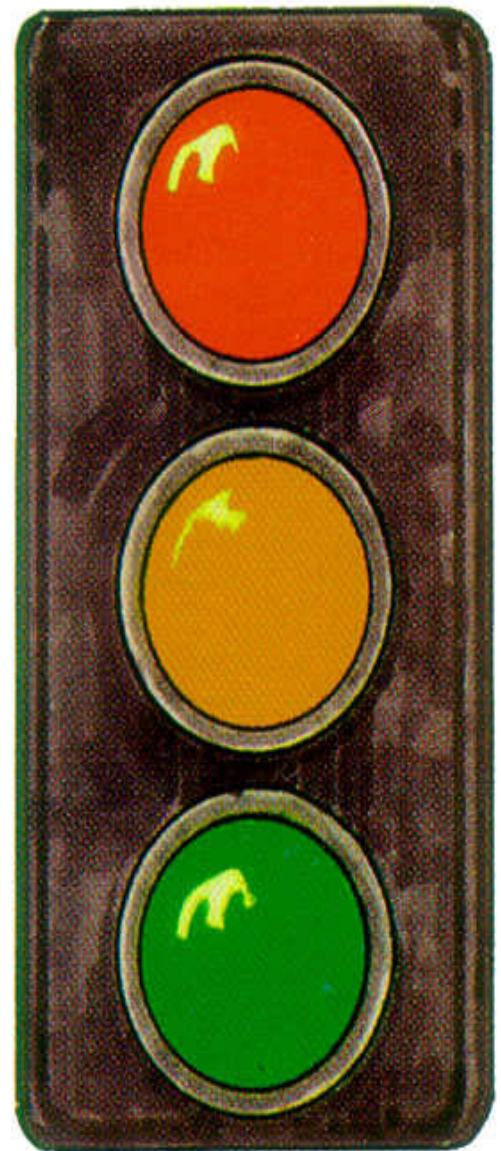
